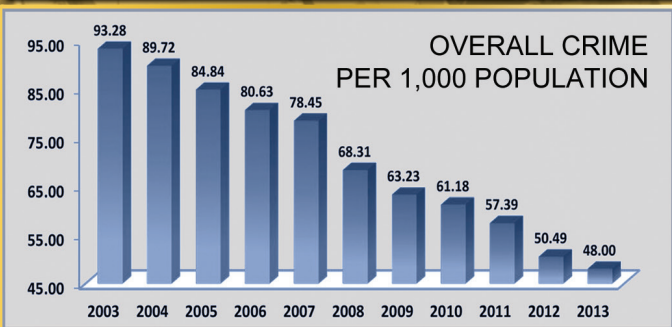
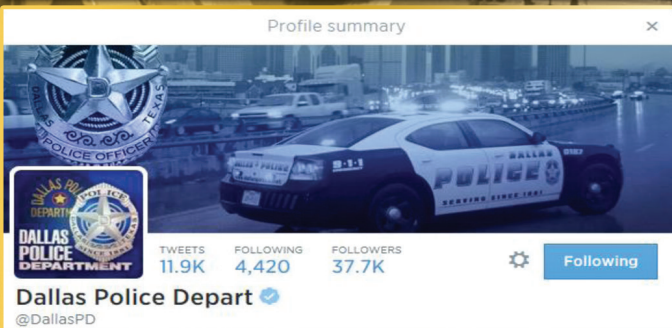

OVERALL CRIME PER 1,000 POPULATION





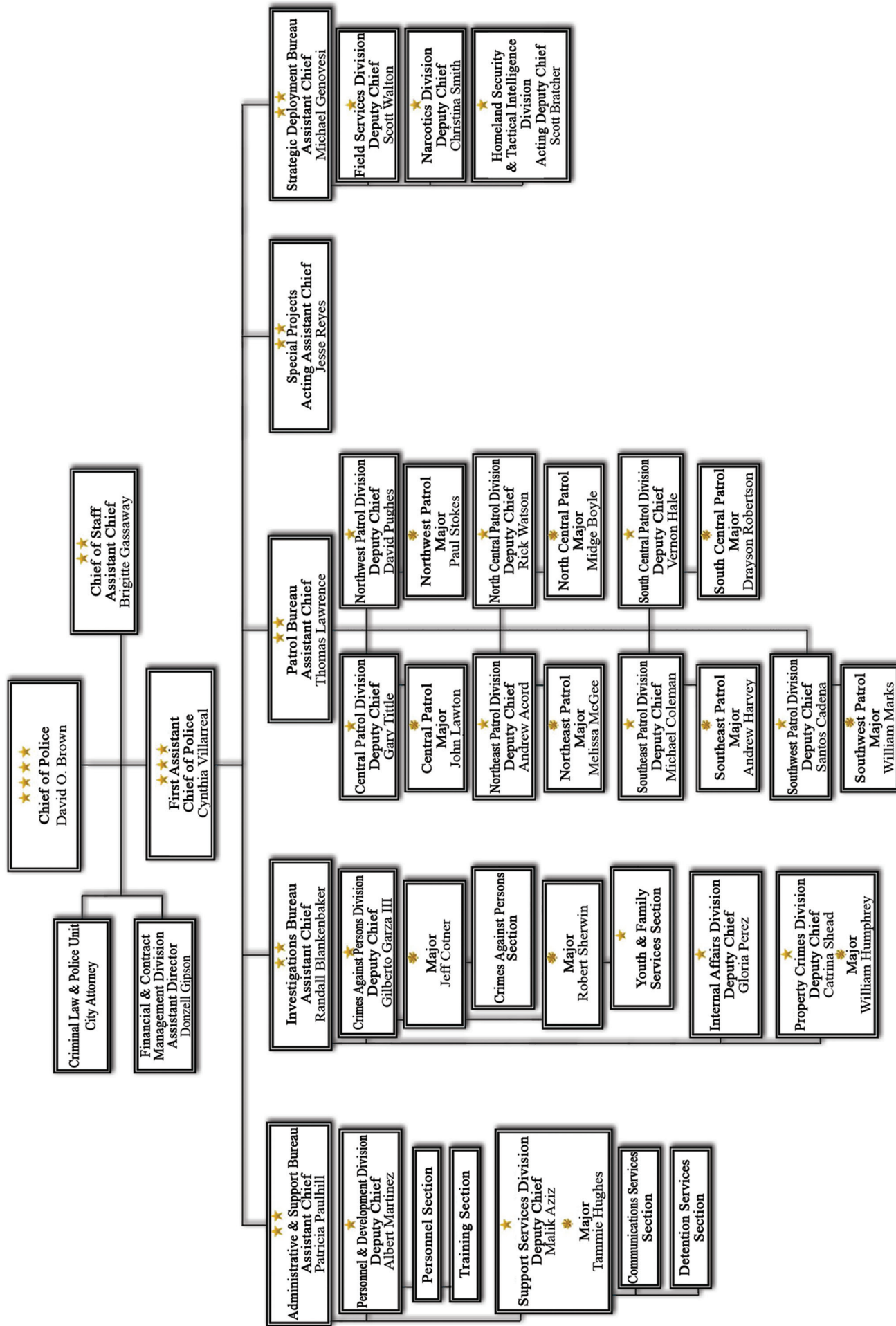

BUDGET & GRANTS

On average, the Dallas Police Department works with eight to ten Federal, State, and Local agencies receiving over \$14.7 million in grant and continuation funds. In addition to the grants awarded to the department, the Budget and Grants team receives and processes overtime reimbursements for over 14 Joint Task Force Operations in the amount of \$600,000.

During FY 2012-2013, the Budget & Grants Section of Financial and Contract Management Division was responsible for managing the Department's \$402 million General Fund budget.

FLEET SERVICES

Fleet Services coordinates the purchase, replacement, and maintenance of marked squad cars, unmarked vehicles, and other related equipment. During FY 2012-13, Fleet Services worked on several initiatives to improve the available transportation and equipment resources including:

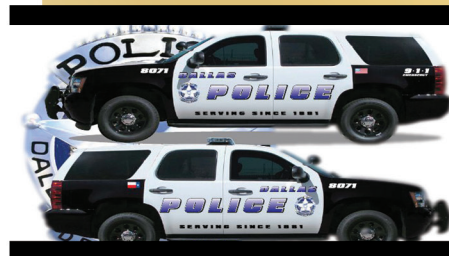
- Replaced over 200 marked squad cars
- Assisted with the new black and white design for Field Services' 2013 Chevrolet Tahoes
- Participated in the Annual Cooper Clinic Auto Show, June 2013
- Moderated a Fleet forum at the Police Fleet Expo in Fort Worth, May 2013
- Coordinated and assisted with CIS to convert all marked squads to L3 DVR system

PARKING ENFORCEMENT

Parking Enforcement has dual reporting responsibilities; to the Patrol Bureau for field operations and enforcement of parking control, and to Financial and Contract Management Division for revenue collections from metered parking spaces and parking citations, and oversight of the City's parking services contract vendor.

During FY12-13 Parking Services:

- Issued 137,090 citations
- Issued 18 new valet licenses

PROCUREMENT

The Procurement Section of the Financial & Contract Management Division develops bid specifications jointly with DPD representatives, works with Business Development & Procurement Service (BDPS) to obtain goods and services, establishes and monitors price agreement contracts, and issues purchase and delivery orders. Additionally, the Procurement Section manages petty cash, travel arrangements, and employee reimbursements.

During FY 2012-2013, the section facilitated the approval and/or management of:

- 120 master agreements
- 11 lease agreements
- 6 grant agreements
- 12 task force agreements
- 18 inter-local agreements and memorandums of understanding (MOU)
- 95 administrative actions for service contracts

Facilitated the purchase process of several thousand goods or services including:

- Over 2,200 delivery orders for purchase of goods on a master agreement
- Over 770 purchase orders for the direct purchase of goods and services
- Over 1,000 employee travel requests and reimbursements
- Over 1,000 petty cash transactions

SAFELIGHT CAMERA PROGRAM

The Safelight Camera Program is an automated red light camera enforcement program designed to reduce the number of right angle collisions and related injuries/fatalities in the City of Dallas.

As part of the outreach program to educate citizens on the danger of running red lights, the Safelight Enforcement Section:

- Attended 12 community events educating the public on the dangers of red light running
- Coordinated a National Stop on Red Week event at the National Mary Kay Convention
- Completed a Texas Department of Transportation post-activation report
- Processed approximately 198,744 red light events
- Forwarded \$1,812,744.10 to the State of Texas to be utilized for statewide trauma centers

6 Year Post-Implementation Review

- 44% reduction in red-light related accidents on intersection approaches with a camera
- 38% reduction in red-light related accidents on all approaches to an intersection with a camera

QUARTERMASTER

Annually serving over 14,000 requests from police employees, the Quartermaster Section is responsible for the ordering, issuance and control of police equipment, phones, radios, and uniforms. In 2013, the Quartermaster began utilizing M5, a real time inventory system to maintain and track all activities.

- Saved over \$272,000 due to recycling efforts
- Issued over 800 Ballistic Vests
- Outfitted 5 Academy Classes
- Deployed over 3,200 Downed Officer Kits

Consisting of the DVR Team, Inspection Team, UCR Unit, the Administrative and Accountability Unit is responsible for coordinating administrative inspections, reviewing DVR videos, and providing Uniform Crime Reports.

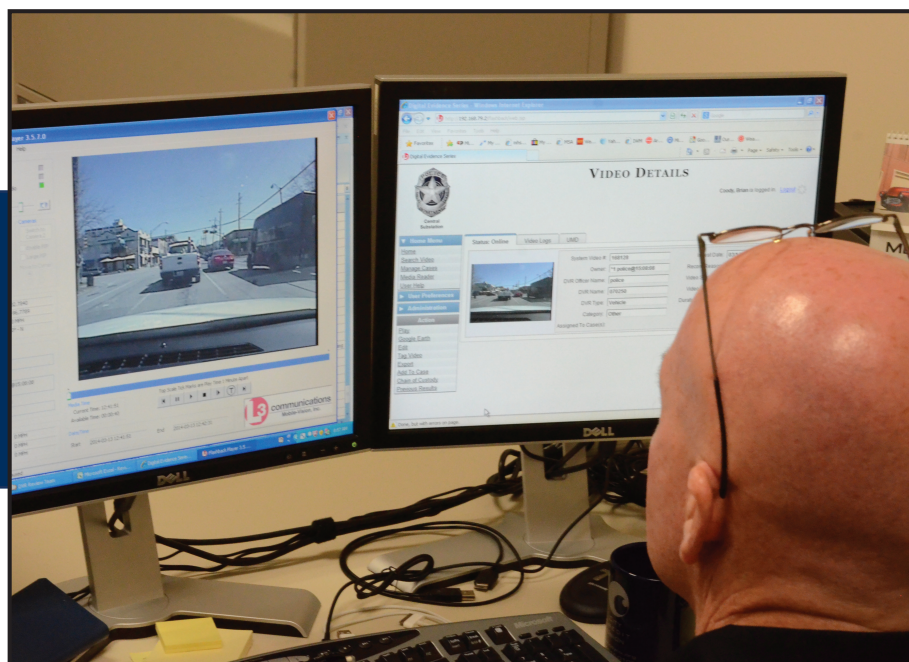

Community Relations Division

The primary responsibility of the Community Affairs Division is to develop trust and improve police/community relations in the City of Dallas, as well as identify crime, problems, and other issues affecting the community. The Community Outreach Representatives act as liaisons between the department and the community to resolve issues and develop solutions. In addition, the Representatives maintain regular contact with the community and community leaders to discuss concerns regarding police services.

- 61,128 contacts were made with citizens regarding police services
- Implemented and completed the 10/70/20 Crime Reduction Program at 17 sites
- Held 780 meetings with individuals and organizations
- Delivered 844 speeches to schools and community organizations
- Provided 3,007 interpretation/translation services to the department and other City departments
- Conducted “Chief on the Beat” Health and Safety Fairs at 14 sites and reached 24,792 citizens
- Hosted premier “Coffee with Cops” event at 7 McDonald’s locations simultaneously

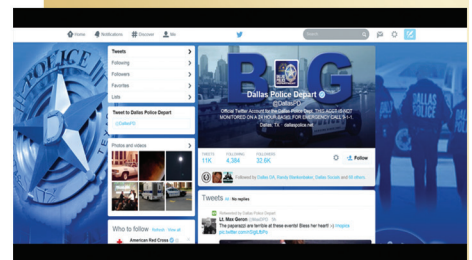
MEDIA RELATIONS UNIT

The Media Relations Unit coordinates press conferences, prepares briefings, and expands social media involvement through Twitter, Facebook and YouTube. Officers in this unit also chronicle departmental special events.

The Dallas Police Department has been very proactive in its approach to social media. Since the inception of the department's Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, Nixle and Next Door accounts, there has been an increase in social media posts which include travel and traffic advisories, crime tips, requests for public assistance during investigations and searches, and illustrated officer success stories, therefore increasing police department transparency.

In 2013, the Dallas Police Department was awarded the number one spot on MPHProgramsList.com's *50 Most Social Media Friendly Police Departments in America's Largest Cities*.





COFFEE WITH COPS



“Coffee with Cops” is a community engagement initiative for residents to get to know the officers working in their neighborhood. The primary goal of the event is to enhance the relationship between the department and the residents of Dallas. On April 6, 2013, the department hosted the first “Coffee with Cops” at an area McDonald’s location in the Southwest Division.

With the success of the initial event, the department rolled out a second “Coffee with Cops” on December 20, 2013, held simultaneously at McDonald’s locations across all seven Patrol Divisions.

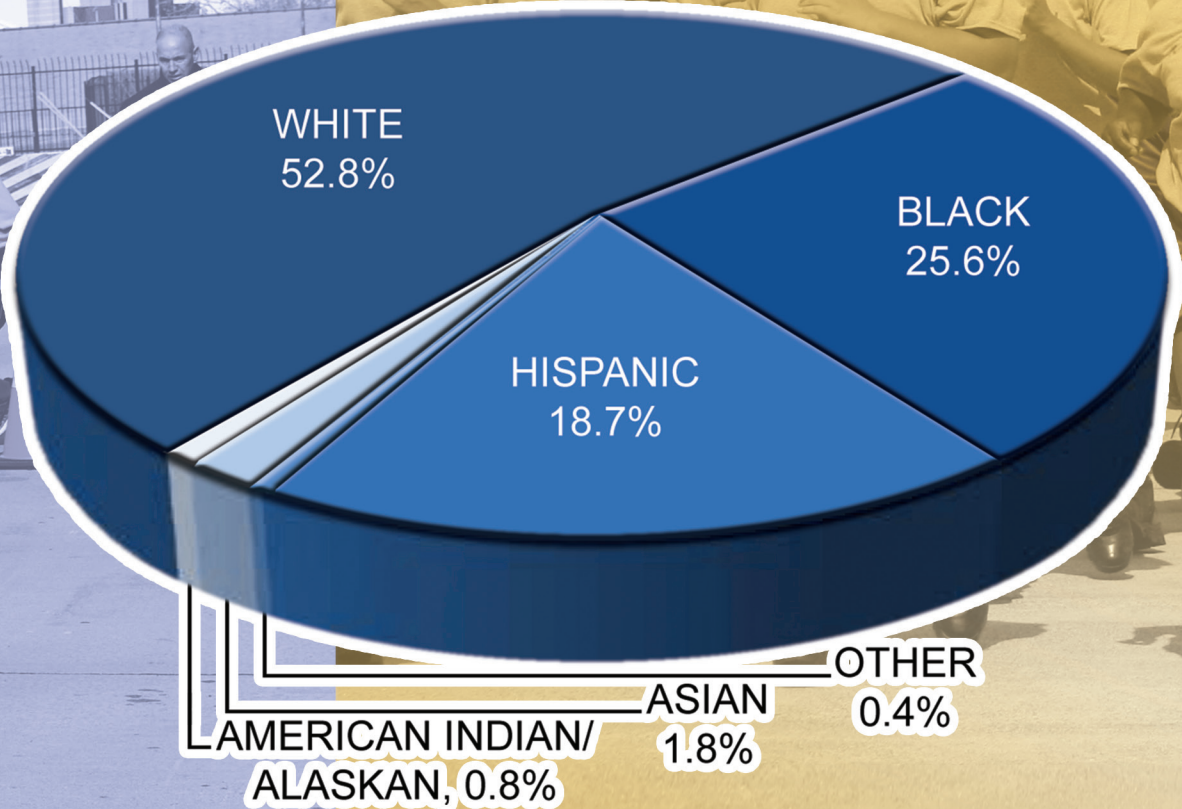

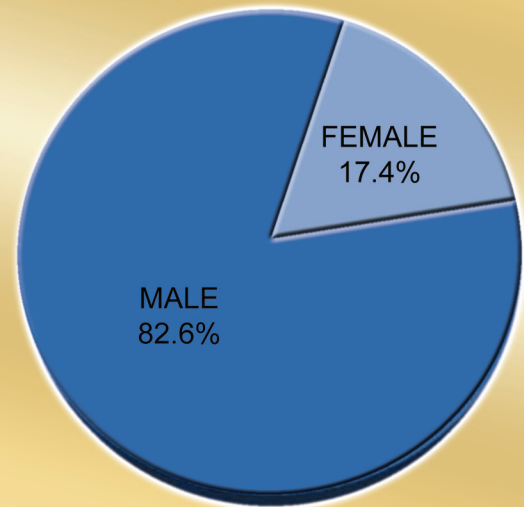

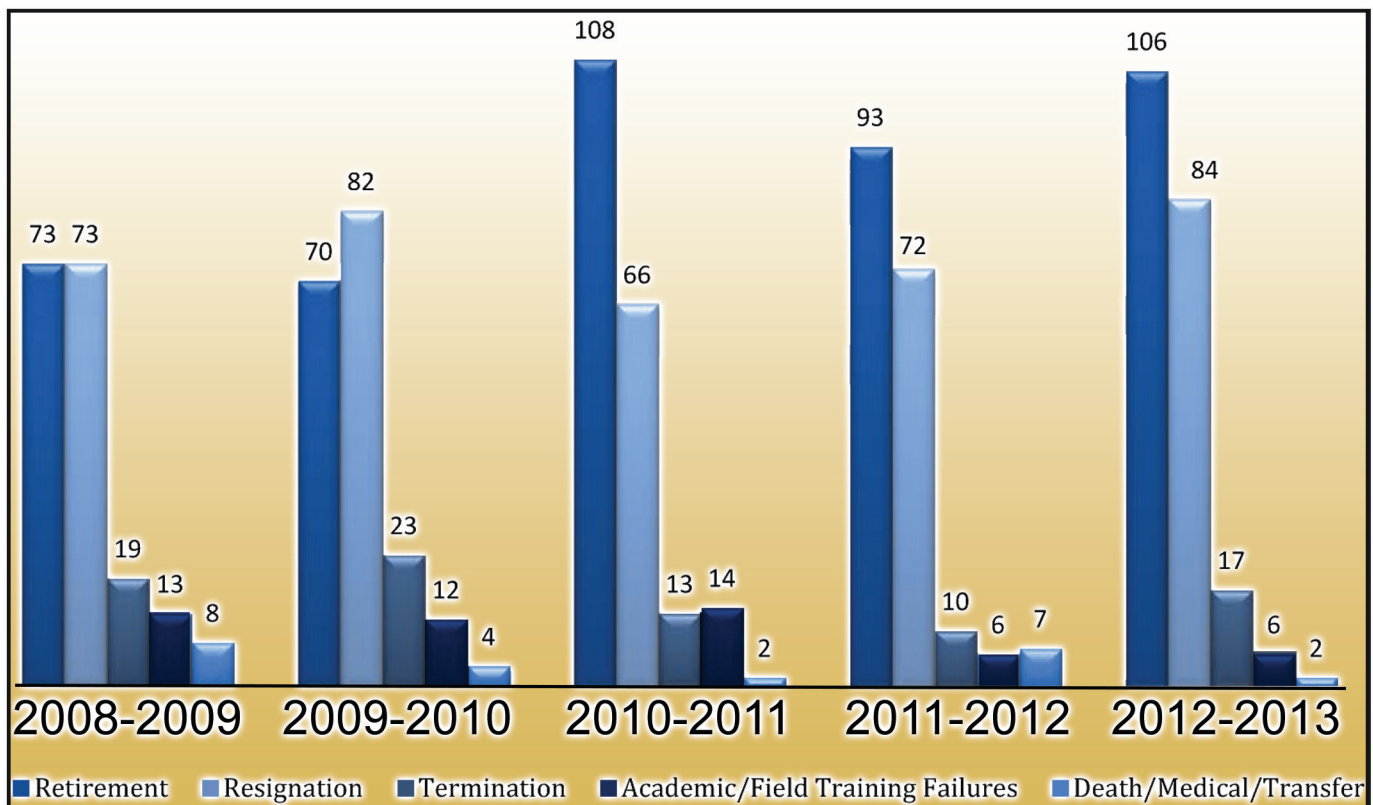

CARUTH POLICE INSTITUTE

The Caruth Police Institute (CPI) had another outstanding year. CPI curriculum served several hundred Dallas Police Department officers in 2013. In addition to graduating twenty lieutenants and one captain from the Executive Series, eight CPI alumni were promoted within the department.

The Sergeant Supervisory Series held two separate six week sessions for newly promoted sergeants. There was also a four week class for senior sergeants. Eighty-five sergeants graduated including sixty-four newly promoted sergeants and twenty-one senior sergeants.

CPI also held programs for its alumni which included a monthly “Literature and Leadership Luncheon” allowing for discussion of ideas found in recently published in business and management books. In addition, CPI continued assisting with the development of the strategic plan. They coordinated a Field Training Officer Symposium to help in the development of enhanced training for new recruits. CPI also took the lead on developing better internal communications within the Dallas Police Department.

CPI coordinated a workshop on the Five Myths of Government Leadership and hosted a presentation by the 2012 National Olympic Security Coordinator Assistant Commissioner Christopher Allison from the London Metropolitan Police Department. Mr. Allison spoke about responding to terrorist attacks and the security measures needed in policing mass events such as the Olympics and Special Olympics.

In 2013, CPI developed training for ten majors and continued civilian leadership training for seventeen non-sworn managers throughout the department. In addition, CPI trained fifteen lieutenants and above from the reserves battalion in the concepts of leadership.

ALARM UNIT

The Alarm Unit is responsible for enforcing the City of Dallas' Alarm Ordinance, conducting inspections, follow-up investigations on alarm violations, and system performance reviews for sites where the alarm system is not working properly or being misused.

- Received 59,712 alarm calls
- Handled 2,826 cases
- Compliance permits obtained: 2,654*
- Held 167 meetings with alarm permit holders and alarm monitoring companies

AUTO POUND UNIT

The Auto Pound Unit is responsible for receiving, processing, and storing vehicles impounded through accidents, the No-Insurance Ordinance, crime scenes, and violations. Additionally, staff prepares for and conducts auctions and manages towing fees resulting in a combined revenue of over \$12.2 million.

- Impounded 34,025 vehicles
- Released 26,492 vehicles
- Auctioned 6,830 vehicles
- Received \$5,071,130 from auctions
- Collected \$7,150,049 in impound fees

PROPERTY UNIT

The Property Unit handles evidence intake and disposition of drugs, guns, and property.

- Disposed of 21,083 property items
- Disposed of by destruct:
 - 6,774 Guns
 - 4,547 Drugs
- Sent 4,577 items to City Purchasing

DETENTION SERVICES SECTION

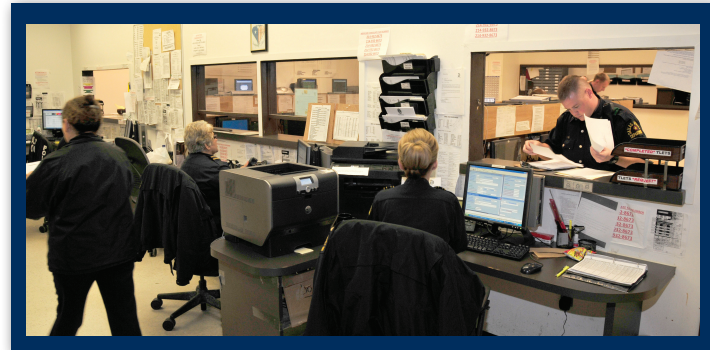
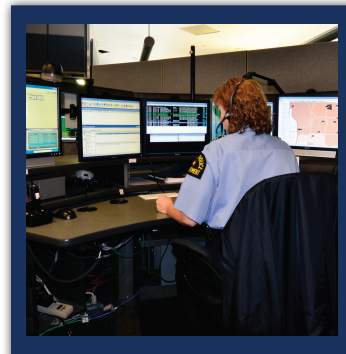
Detention Services handles the initial processing of arrested individuals at Low Sterrett Jail while also ensuring the implementation of and adherence to the Texas Breath Alcohol Testing Regulations.

- Processed 44,156 prisoners
- Processed 2,306 DWI's
- Conducted 5 No-Refusal Initiatives
- Made 208 arrests
- 71 warrants for blood draws

COMMUNICATIONS SERVICES SECTION

Consisting of 9-1-1, Radio Room, NCIC, and Expediter/Direct Entry / Staff Review, the Communications Services Section has 359 sworn and non-sworn employees who are responsible for receiving and dispatching emergency calls, providing staff review services for all offense/arrest reports, and providing monitoring of downtown surveillance cameras.

- Received 1,933,291 calls to 9-1-1
- Expediter unit handled 22,288 calls
- Dispatched 595,503 calls for service

Support Services Division

LEGAL SERVICES UNIT

The Legal Services Unit processes Direct Files, At Large Case filings, and Out of County Filings. They also assist detectives with case filing preparation and city attorney requests.

- Handled 13,804 Direct File in Custody cases
- Filed 4,914 At Large cases
- Made 660 Out of County Filings
- Processed 1,805 Writs

OPEN RECORDS UNIT

The Open Records Unit coordinates records retention for the department and is responsible for responding to external record requests.

- Processed 14,208 open record requests averaging 1,184 per month
- Copied 866,534 pages of requested material
- Received payments of \$33,621.97 for requested material

RECORDS UNIT

The Records Unit is the central repository for accident reports, arrest reports, offense reports, and prosecution reports. They conduct criminal background checks, assist customers with report requests, and archive report data.

- Assisted 93,412 customers
- Processed 163,459 reports
- Collected revenue totaling \$280,481
- Conducted 12,560 NCIC/TCIC criminal background checks
- Processed 4,341 legally mandated requests
- Processed 1,653 petitions/orders of expunction
- Scanned 51,304 documents into the Fortis database

VIOLENT CRIMES SECTION

CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS SECTION

Consisting of Assaults, Homicide, Robbery, Major Case Investigative, and Victim Services, detectives in this Section investigate active assault, homicide, business robberies, cold case homicide and sexual assaults. Additionally, the section conducts line-up administration and polygraph testing, provides victim services, investigates police and high profile shootings, and participates on the FBI Robbery Task Force.

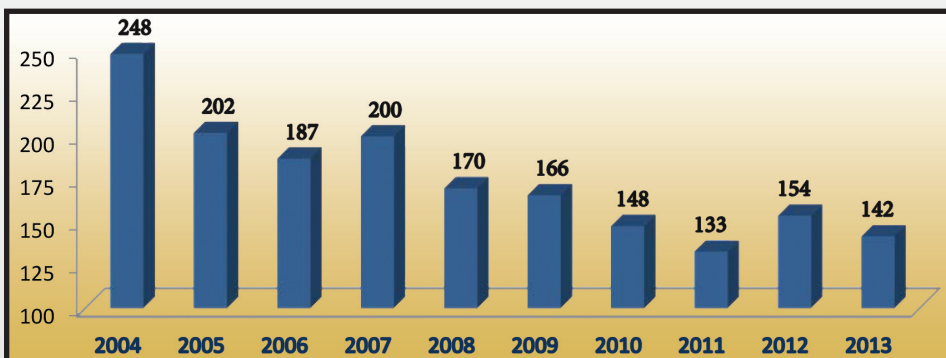

CRIME SCENE RESPONSE SECTION

The Crime Scene Response Section processes crime scenes involving both property and violent crimes, requests AFIS verifications, processes manual latent prints, prepares forensic photo and video cases, and provides criminal history verifications.

- Processed 19,329 crime scenes
- Made 9,089 AFIS latent inquiries
- Made 1,504 AFIS latent identifications
- Performed 1,467 manual latent comparisons
- Completed 8,787 criminal history verifications
- Made 3,847 NIBIN evidence submissions
- Made 1,562 NIBIN identifications

YOUTH SERVICES SECTION

FAMILY VIOLENCE UNIT

The Family Violence Unit is responsible for investigating dating assaults, sexual assaults, robberies, burglaries, assaults, aggravated assaults, and strangulations all related to family violence offenses.

- Received reports of 13,007 offenses
- Received reports of 1,215 aggravated assaults
- Investigated 10,107 family violence related offenses
- Filed 4,534 cases

LETHALITY ASSESSMENT PROGRAM

The Lethality Assessment Program (LAP) is an effective method that identifies victims of domestic violence who are at risk of being seriously injured or killed by their intimate partners and immediately connects them to domestic violence service providers in their area. In 2013, the Dallas Police Department conducted 7,295 LAP surveys and over 3,000 victims have made contact with counselors to seek assistance.

CRIMES AGAINST CHILDREN UNIT

The Crimes Against Children Unit consists of the Child Abuse Squad, Child Exploitation, High Risk Victims Team, Internet Crimes Against Children, Sex Offender Compliance & Registration, and Sexual Offender Apprehension Program (SOAP).

- Investigated 770 child exploitation cases involving minor children
- Investigated 1,301 child abuse cases
- Conducted 2,400 sex offender compliance checks
- Completed 10,620 registration updates for registered sex offenders
- Investigated 2,339 reports of technology facilitated exploitation of children
- Investigated 537 high risk victim and trafficking offenses

YOUTH OPERATIONS UNIT

Consisting of Youth Operations, Missing Persons and the First Offender Program, the unit is responsible for investigating juvenile offenses, missing and at-risk persons, and registering youths for the first offender program.

- Arrested 1,720 youth for delinquency
- Cleared 1,740 youth related offenses
- Investigated 5,239 missing person cases

The Internal Affairs Division provides personnel support through the Employee Development Program, conducts random drug testing, investigates officer involved shootings and citizen complaints.

MID-LEVEL INVESTIGATIONS

The Major Crimes Unit initiated 61 mid-level investigations in 2013. Major Crimes Unit is responsible for recovering assets totaling \$1,207,999.00 worth of stolen property

- 34 fencing locations and 3 e-fences were closed
- Detectives made 47 arrests of Penalty F3 or higher for the offense of Organized Retail Theft

Major Crimes Unit continues to work with local retailers to help reduce their losses. Representatives from Redbox Inc., based in Chicago, flew to Dallas to meet with detectives from the Major Crimes Unit to detail losses of over a quarter million dollars occurring only in the Dallas market. Through undercover operations, Major Crimes Unit detectives were quickly able to identify the suspects responsible for these crimes and on-view the criminal acts. Detectives observed multijurisdictional criminal episodes as they were occurring, and coordinated that information with surrounding agencies to prepare the appropriate case filings. After executing three search warrants, detectives made three felony arrests and recovered over \$150,000.00 worth of stolen games and movies that were returned to the complainant.



INVESTIGATIONS BUREAU

Property Crimes Division



PROPERTY CRIMES DIVISION

The Property Crimes Division investigates cases involving burglary, theft, auto theft, and financial crimes, as well as many other crimes against property. Property crimes investigated by the Property Crimes Division represent approximately 86% of all Part 1 crimes reported to the FBI each year.

In 2013, Property Crimes were reduced by 3.93% compared to the previous year. The department saw reductions in burglaries of 10.14% and thefts of 2.65%

- Investigated 70,431 offenses
- Filed 2,890 cases with the District Attorney
- Recovered \$5,838,226 in property value from burglary offenses

AUTO THEFT UNIT

Detectives in this Unit are responsible for investigating auto theft related cases such as individual auto thefts, chop shops and cargo thefts.

- Investigated 2,361 auto theft cases (leads were available)
- Investigated 4,975 auto theft cases (no leads available)
- Inspected 217 auto shops
- Cleared 1,072 auto theft offenses

FINANCIAL INVESTIGATIONS UNIT

The Financial Investigations Unit investigates identity theft, credit card abuse, tampering with governmental record, forgery, false statement to obtain property or credit, hindering secure credit, embezzlement, employee theft of \$1,500 or more, theft by deception, swindles, scams, frauds, and all computer crimes to include cyber bullying.

Financial Investigations Unit detectives worked the following:

- 4,032 offenses
- 2,715 walk-ins
- 345 cases were filed
- 20,670 calls





PATROL BUREAU

METRO TASK FORCE

Created in late 2012, the METRO Task Force was created to target repeat offenders, police hotspots, disrupt criminal enterprises, reduce crime and address chronic neighborhood issues.

- 49 murder suspects arrested
- Made 2,136 felony warrant arrests
- Made 885 misdemeanor warrant arrests and 1,543 in the act arrests
- Recovered 217 stolen vehicles
- Seized 326 guns
- Seized/recovered \$202,161

NUISANCE ABATEMENT TEAM

The Nuisance Abatement detectives investigate properties with a history of abatable criminal activity as defined by Texas State Law and work with these property owners to reduce and eliminate criminal activity.

- Conducted 6,662 inspections and re-inspections
- Closed 288 cases

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT UNIT

The Crime Response Team (CRT), Deployment Unit and Neighborhood Policing Unit are proactive policing teams that focus on impacting the criminal element and solving chronic community quality of life issues.

CRT & DEPLOYMENT

The Crime Response Teams and Deployment Teams in each division make a positive impact on crime reduction by responding to critical calls for service. Crime Response Teams focus on the apprehension of criminal suspects and assist in special projects aimed to reduce crime. Tips on criminal and drug complaints from the community are relayed to the Teams. The Deployment Teams focus on covert surveillance, fugitive apprehension, and intelligence gathering. This information is then passed on to detectives.

NEIGHBORHOOD POLICING TEAMS

The Neighborhood Policing Team oversees management of the Dallas Convenience Store Ordinance and Crime Watch Executive Board, and in conjunction with Community Affairs coordinates National Night Out in Dallas.

- Attended over 8,900 community meetings
- Implemented 278 new crime watches
- Conducted 405 home and business security surveys
- Attended 180 Heath & Safety Fairs





DOWNED OPERATOR KIT



In 2012, a grant from the Hoblitzelle Foundation was awarded and provided for the purchase of twenty-three Downed Operator Kits. Initially, the kits were issued to some of our high risk units (SWAT, GANG, METRO, Narcotics) and placed in vehicles that normally respond to critical incidents.

During the test phase, one of the kits proved to be invaluable and was used to save the life of an individual who was shot in the leg when his handgun accidentally discharged. The tourniquet from a kit was applied to the individual's leg and it stopped the blood loss.

Upon arrival, Dallas Fire and Rescue were able to transport the individual without delay. Doctors later confirmed that the individual's femoral artery and vein had been severed and credited the application of the tourniquet with saving his life.

The Downed Operator Kits have proven to be extremely effective in enabling officers to provide initial medical care for serious trauma related injuries to citizens and officers alike. There is no question these kits will save lives.

The goal was to eventually provide kits to all officers on the department. In 2013, the Dallas Police Department issued over 3,200 Downed Operator Kits to all officers. Consisting of a tourniquet, Olas modular bandage, and combat gauze, these medical kits are designed to be carried by officers on their person. Reserve Lieutenant Dr. Alex Eastman believes these kits are a critical tool that officers now have and stated "as it is not possible to put a trauma surgeon on the Sam Browne of every officer out there, so our option was to give them the best equipment and training we could."

This is another example of the Dallas Police Department making our officers and the community safer one step at a time.





SPECIAL PROJECTS BUREAU



CRISIS INTERVENTION

Crisis Intervention provides on-the-scene stabilization for citizens in crisis. The unit also provides social services during relief operations for citizens during civil emergencies and natural disasters.

- Made 1,038 contacts
- Conducted 791 assessments
- Made 271 placements
- Coordinated 79 family reunifications
- Performed 367 stabilization plans

VOLUNTEER PROGRAMS

The Dallas Police Department has several volunteer programs where citizens devote their personal time to assist in crime reduction and perform various administrative functions. All of the Dallas Police Department's volunteer programs are non-confrontational.

In 2013, volunteers had assignments in the Property Room, Crime Scene Response Unit, and Crisis Intervention. Others assisted with Police Athletic League (PAL) events, Volunteer in Patrol training, Junior Police Academy functions, Citizen Police Academy training and participated in CERT (Citizens Emergency Response Team) as actors and participants.

Citizens Helping In Parking Solutions (C.H.I.P.S.) had 36 volunteers
Volunteers in Patrol (V.I.P.) had 1,240 volunteers
Citizens Offering Police Support (C.O.P.S.) had 97 volunteers



RESERVE BATTALION

Designed to be supplement officers to the Department, the Reserve Battalion has become an invaluable resource. Annually, they provide thousands of hours of police support.

- 627 assignments within the Patrol Bureau for 4,797 hours
- 135 assignments for 635 hours in the Strategic Deployment Bureau
- 307 assignments within the Investigations Bureau for 2,032 hours
- 977 assignments for 5,544 hours in the Administrative & Support Bureau

BLUE IN THE SCHOOL

The Blue In The School Program began in the Fall of 2013 as a partnership between the Dallas Police Department, Dallas Public Schools Psychological and Social Services, and Verizon Wireless. A series of lessons on life skills such as decision-making, self-confidence building, peer pressure reversal techniques, and character education are taught by Dallas police officers. These lessons equip students to resist temptations associated with violence, bullying, peer pressure, and unhealthy behaviors.

- Served 13 elementary schools
- Reached 1,287 children



EXPLORER PROGRAM

Through the Boy Scouts of America, the Dallas Police Explorer Program has Explorer Posts at each of its seven patrol stations with 115 Explorers. Young adults between the ages of 14 and 21 must apply and meet specific criteria to join such as a background check and passing a structured review board. Upon joining an Explorer Post, these young adults are challenged to provide community service through many volunteering opportunities while learning about law enforcement through training, completion of the Basic Explorer Training Program, and competing in Police Explorer Competitions.

JUNIOR POLICE ACADEMY

There were three Junior Police Academy Sessions in 2013 where a total of 170 students in grades 4th through 10th participated. This was the first year DPD held an advanced session for grades 8-10th.

The sessions cover topics such as Family Violence Awareness, Gang Avoidance, Crisis Negotiation, Personal Safety, Life Skills Training, and presentations by the DEA, MADD, and Suspicious Person Detection.

Activities are also a big part of the Junior Police Academy. This year's events included physical training, observation of traffic stop procedures, rides in squad cars, obstacle courses, motorcycles, SWAT, Low Rider, use of DWI goggles, 9-1-1 tour and practice calling 9-1-1, Mounted Unit, Helicopter, K-9, and tours of the Fusion Center, Gang Unit and Crime Scene Response Section.

UNIDOS PROGRAM

The Latino Community Outreach Program is designed to provide assistance to spanish speaking residents in the Dallas area. Unidos meetings are held throughout the year entirely in Spanish. The intent of the program is to act as a resource center for Spanish speaking residents and present information and provide assistance in areas of importance to the Latino community. Unidos goals are to reduce victimization, build trust between the community and the Dallas Police Department, educate the public on important legal and social issues, and make neighborhoods safer. In 2013, 29 events were held with over 1,200 participants.

CITIZEN POLICE ACADEMY

The Citizen Police Academy is a revolutionary concept in Law Enforcement and police community relations. More than a training program, the Dallas Police Department's Citizen Police Academy serves as a window of opportunity specifically designed to allow the public a hand-in hand guided tour to the world of local law enforcement service.

EXPLOSIVE ORDNANCE SQUAD

Officers in this squad work jointly with DPD and Dallas Fire & Rescue. They respond to bomb threats and explosive device calls. In June, along with Region 2 members, the Squad co-hosted the International Association of Bomb Technicians and Investigators International Training Conference and Exhibition. The Conference was attended by more than 500 people from all over the world.

- Conducted 7 dignitary sweeps
- Coordinated efforts and was the primary response and render safe team for the George Bush Presidential Library Opening
- Conducted 68 follow-up investigations



MOUNTED UNIT

The Mounted Squad provides trained equestrian teams to assist seven Patrol Divisions in all aspects of operations including crime detection and prevention, making arrests, issuing citations, and answering calls for assistance. Additionally, the squad is utilized for crowd control, dignitary protection, and searches in remote areas for missing or wanted persons.

HELICOPTER UNIT

Officers in this Unit supply air support to the geographic patrol divisions and specialized units of the department. They provide rapid response, tactical insight, and airborne assessments of criminal activity and incidents.

- Assisted with 453 arrests
- Located 33 missing persons

SPECIAL EVENTS

Additionally, SWAT is tasked to supplement the Department with special crime initiatives, conduct static displays in conjunction with various community outreach programs, and provide continuous critical mission training to SWAT members and non-SWAT members of the Department.

TACTICAL CANINE UNIT

The Canine Squad is assigned to the Field Services Division with the mission of providing trained canine teams to assist patrol operations in locating and apprehending criminal offenders, conducting searches, and performing special assignments as requested.

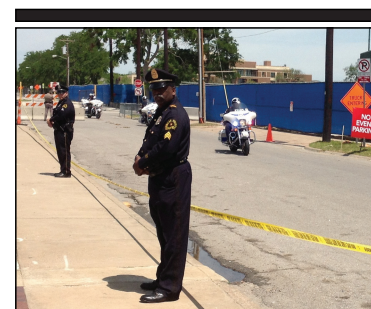

PROSTITUTE DIVERSION PROGRAM

The Operational Technology Unit oversees technology assets used by the Department to fight crime throughout the City of Dallas. Much of the Department's technology initiatives are geared toward the TAAG areas in an effort to reduce crimes in these particular areas.

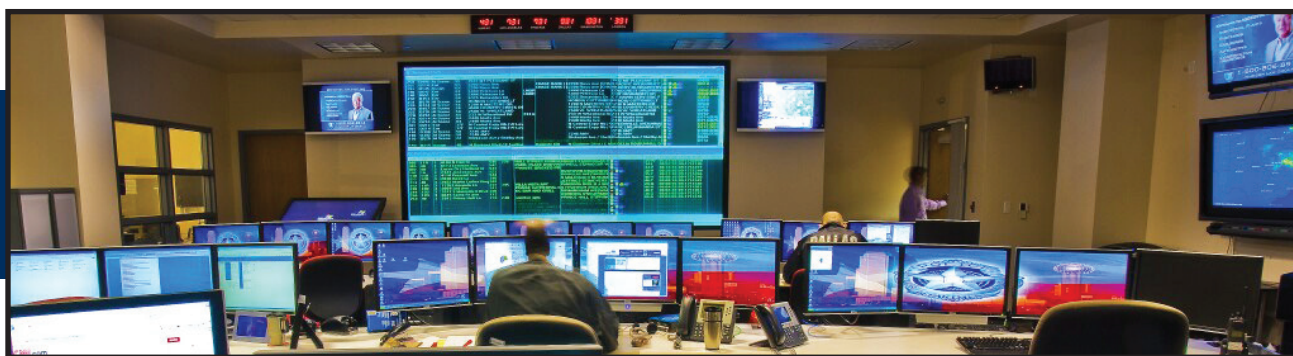


